

Experience 'Divine Inspiration' with Bournemouth Symphony Orchestra

This September in Weymouth and Chichester, the BSO will perform a trio of masterpieces inspired by greatness.

On Thursday 12 September in Weymouth and Saturday 14 September in Chichester, Bournemouth Symphony Orchestra, Classic FM's Orchestra in the South of England, will perform three divine pieces by two of the best-known composers in classical music,

Schubert's Overture in D will be followed by two of Beethoven's masterworks, his Violin Concerto and his Symphony No.4. Beethoven's Violin Concerto will be performed by Daniel Auner, an award-winning Violinist judged by The Strad to be "technically impeccable" in a performance last Spring.

Schubert's Italian influences are evident in his Overture in D, and it's majestic and visionary depictions of Italy's gorgeous landscapes are matched in evocative beauty by the piece that follows. Beethoven used his only violin concerto to capture the intense skill required to play the instrument to a high standard.

The concerts will conclude with Beethoven's Symphony No.4, judged by fellow composer Hector Berlioz to be so great as to be the work of the Archangel Michael, rather than that of a human.

These concerts will be conducted by Marta Gardolińska, the BSO's Young Conductor in Association. Marta has been wowing audiences since she joined the Orchestra in September 2018, with Classical Source describing her as "highly promising and exciting conductor".
